PASTOR'S PAGE

This Lenten season we've used both the Apostles Creed and the Nicene Creed in the context of worship. The Nicene Creed was intended to unite the church. What happened was the Roman Empire was too big for one man to rule effectively and it almost collapsed during the 3rd Century. It had been divided from the establishment of the Tetrarchy in 293, until Constantine's defeat of Licinius in 324. Now Constantine was faced with the task of reuniting it, and found the church and the skills of its bishops to be a useful tool.

If you've been studying with us on Wednesday evenings, we've learned that it was through the order of Constantine that Christianity was legalized in the Empire. Before that it was an underground movement, but the early Christians did not relent and became more brazen in advancing the cause.

The whole church at the time, however, was divided over Christology. So Constantine called 318 bishops together, in 325, to settle the issue. They met at Nicaea, in what's now western Turkey. After much debate, the Council declared that Christ was made of the same substance as the Father, co-eternal, and that all things were made through him. This set the scene for a series of divisive creeds, written by one side or the other in accordance with the preference of the reigning emperor. Under Constantius II, a son of Constantine who won a civil war against his brothers, and came to be sole ruler of the empire, a series of Arian creeds was produced. Orthodoxy was finally restored by Theodosius I, the last man to rule the united Roman empire.

True to its purpose the Nicene Creed has served through the centuries as a cornerstone for what we believe about God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit. It is the very heart of our faith. The Nicene Creed steadied the Church as it navigated treacherous ground in becoming Rome's dominant religion. We must allow it to steady us today as we evangelize to a world where Christianity is no longer dominant in the Western world.

The creed is an extremely powerful symbol of the global unity of the Christian Church. The Council of Nicaea was the first council to draw Christians from all over the world. Bishops came from Spain and India, Britain and Africa and all lands in between to attend the council.

As a result, the creed unites many Christian communities otherwise separated by so much; Catholic, Orthodox, Protestant, Pentecostal. We all trace our lineage to the bishops and theologians who gathered in the early fourth century at Nicaea. By making the Nicene Creed one of our doctrinal standards we embrace United Methodism's place in "Christ's universal Church".

STEWARSHIP MESSAGE

“give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back.”(Luke 6:38)

Fairness in the exchange of goods and services is of great importance. Establishing uniform weights and measures was written into the U.S. Constitution (Art. 1, Sec. 8) and just weights and measures are addressed on several occasions in the Bible. For example, one of God commands the Israelites, “You shall not cheat in measuring length, weight, or quantity. You shall have just balances, just weights, a just ephah[.6 bushel], and a just hin[1 gallon],” Leviticus 19:35-36.

We might think that “a good measure” in Luke 6:38 means a large amount, but what follows is a recipe for giving a fair or just amount (probably of wheat). Fill the basket, press it down, shake it, make sure it is running over. The lesson is that if you expect good measure, you should give good measure. This formula works with God as well as with humans.

Aren't we taught in the Lord's Prayer to expect forgiveness in proportion to how forgiving we are? We should expect the same to pertain to compassion, to mercy, and to generosity. According to John Wesley, this means God lets us decide how much blessing we wish to receive. And why would we wish to receive anything but the greatest measure of God's blessings.

How does your giving to the operations of the church and to missions appear in light of this formula? Does your giving reflect a faith that you will receive generously? Or does it reflect something other than complete trust in God's generosity?

WHY IS MY GIVING TAX-DEDUCTIBLE?

March 1, 2017 is the 100th anniversary of the Zimmerman Telegram, a proposal from Germany to Mexico, that Mexico ally with Germany should the United States enter World War I. Partly because of the telegram's publication, support in the United States for joining the war grew significantly and war was declared early in April.

Mexico stayed neutral. Congress resolved to increase taxes to fund the war effort. For the first time, the impact of taxes on charitable giving became an issue. The Washington Post opined:

If the government takes all or nearly all of one's disposable income or surplus income . . . it must then support all those works of charity and mercy and all the educational and religious works which in this country have heretofore been supported by private benevolence .Eventually, Congress passed the War Revenue Act of 1917, which increased the income tax and corporate tax significantly. However, the Act also provided a deduction for: contributions or gifts actually made within the year to corporations or associations organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, or educational purposes, or to societies for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals

The deduction for charitable gifts has continued to the present day and allows the public to maximize their gifts to religious, educational and charitable organizations. In 2015, Wisconsin United Methodists in 35,231 households donated to regular giving for their congregations a total of \$52,303,000. An additional \$14,285,000 was given, mostly by these same United Methodist households, to special offerings, fundraisers, capital campaigns and memorials, bequests or endowments.


